Mind Wide Open: Reading information in a Digital World

News-Smart: Spotting and Debunking Fake News Through Media Literacy By Christopher Withers

This one-hour language arts workshop on fake news aims to make teenagers “news-smart”, that is, media literate by becoming, first, aware of the impact and context of fake news online and, second, trained to spot and debunk it. In this workshop B1-C2 teen learners of EFL will activate their skills in reading, listening, and speaking through activities designed for them to interact and mediate with their peers. They will also scan, skim, and read for gist; relay information, make predictions, express opinions and defend reasons. To build critical thinking, they will discover firsthand how to evaluate news sources at face value, to fact-check, to investigate cultural references, to weigh personal bias, and to identify or infer an author’s purpose. Only authentic U.S. sourced documents, i.e. news items intended for the American general public, have been selected as hands-on resources because of their high cultural content, the social issues they address, and their proliferation online.

Interpreting Visual Culture: The Impact of Photos

In this workshop we will consider the choices photographers (photojournalists and artists) make about how to take a photograph, and we will think about how those choices can affect viewers emotionally. Students will get practice using new vocabulary, making comparisons, and debating about artistic choices in the context of photography. All participants should come away with a greater understanding of how and why photos can make a lasting impact on viewers.
